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A Message from the Superintendent

Vote in Important May Election



Superintendent Behm

Next month there is a very important election within the Forest Hills Public School district and in Michigan. On Tuesday, May 5, 2015, Forest Hills voters will have the opportunity to go to the polls and make a decision on two main issues.

School district approve the millage renewal, it will continue to provide approximately \$15 million in revenue for district operations and will not increase the tax rate paid by property owners. If this millage does not pass, the state of Michigan will not replace the funding and Forest Hills Public Schools will be forced to reduce or cut programs to offset the loss in revenue.

The second item on the May ballot is Proposal 1, a statewide ballot initiative that will raise funds to improve Michigan's roads and bridges.

Voters will decide on May 5, 2015, whether to:

- Create a funding stream that the constitution guarantees must go to roads, bridges and transportation. No longer would the state Legislature be able to divert state taxes we pay at the pump to non-transportation purposes.
- Require road builders to warranty the roads they build; violators of the warranty would pay for subsequent repairs.
- Replace the revenue local communities and schools would lose from the elimination of sales tax on gas by increasing the sales tax from 6 percent to 7 percent; groceries and prescription drugs will con-

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First, the Forest Hills Public Schools is asking the community to consider a renewal of its non-homestead millage. Non-homesteads are industrial, commercial, some agricultural property, and "second homes." It does not include a family's primary residence.

This non-homestead millage is not new, as we only ask voters to renew this millage once every 10 years. It is NOT an increase of mills. Funding for school districts changed significantly in 1993-1994 when Proposal A was passed by Michigan voters. Under Proposal A, the state of Michigan pays the majority of the cost, but to receive full funding, schools must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property in their district—hence this upcoming renewal on May 5.

If voters within the Forest Hills Public

tinue to be exempt from the sales tax.

- Create a constitutional protection for the School Aid Fund, directing 100 percent of School Aid Fund revenue to K-12 schools and community colleges only. Four-year colleges would be excluded.
- Reinstate the Earned Income Tax Credit.

Presently, Michigan spends less per capita than other Midwest states on roads and bridges. If Proposal 1 passes, Michigan's sales tax rate would be the same as Indiana's, and still lower than Ohio's, Minnesota's and Illinois'. Ultimately, Proposal 1 is about much more than a 1 percent increase in the state's sales tax. It will have an effect both on the condition of our roads and Michigan's schools.

Whether voting by absentee ballot, or going to the polls on Election Day, Tuesday, May 5, our responsibility, as stewards of the community's assets and trust, is to ensure that our citizens are aware of these proposals and their impact on school funding.



Exemplifying the best in creativity, hard work, determination and teamwork, 14 Forest Hills Public Schools Odyssey of the Mind teams took the stage at the State OM Finals. Of the 14 Forest Hills teams, half of the teams have advanced to the World OM Finals at Michigan State University in May. The teams could select their problem to solve, and their problem descriptions are explained here. Teams competing in "Experiencing Technical Difficulties" had to come up with solutions to design, build and demonstrate various devices that complete specific tasks. Teams competing in "Pandora's Box" had to put a video game spin on the story of Pandora's Box. In the "Lose Your Marbles" problem, teams had to design, build and test a structure, made only of balsa wood and glue, that balanced and supported as much weight as possible. The structure also had to hold five marbles that were to be released during weight placement as a result of a team-created device removing a piece of the structure. Finally, in the "Silent Movie" category, teams had to create and present a performance depicting a director character that produces and presents a silent movie featuring a humorous villain that commits three silly acts.

eAchieve Coming to High Schools in the Fall of 2015

The Forest Hills Public School district is excited to launch a new high-school initiative for the 2015-2016 school year. This new initiative is called “eAchieve,” and is based on the premise of digital learning and the educational opportunities it affords for students, teachers, and all learners. With eAchieve, beginning on the first day of the 2015-2016 school year, our three high schools—Central, Eastern, and Northern—will encourage all students to bring their own digital device to school for instructional purposes.


While iPhones, smartphones, and tablets are considered digital devices, the recommended device would be equipped with a larger screen, a keyboard, and Internet capabilities. If families are unable to procure a device for a student, students will be provided with one when required by the teacher.

According to Scott Korpak, assistant superintendent of instruction, as the district continues to supplement traditional hard-cover textbooks with digital resources; some courses may only incorporate a device occasionally, while others will utilize digital resources daily. “From the first day of school, our teachers will collaborate with students about how to best integrate technology and electronic devices in their learning,” Korpak

said. “Digital literacy and digital citizenship will also be addressed.”

Using technology in the classroom and optimizing digital educational resources isn’t something new for Forest Hills. In fact, the implementation of eAchieve in all three FHPS high schools is the result of a year-and-a-half-long pilot program involving students in middle and high school classrooms throughout our district. “As a result of this pilot program, and our additional research and testing, we believe eAchieve will help position our students for success in an increasingly digital, global world,” Korpak said.

“One of the many strengths of our district is our recognition of individual student learning needs; one size does not fit all in education and each learner is different and unique,” said Dan Behm, superintendent. “This is especially true when it comes to using technology in an educational environment. According to Behm, during last year’s eAchieve pilot program, it became apparent that having access to individual digital devices allowed both students and teachers an amazing degree of flexibility, permitting them to leverage their interests and learning styles with global resources.



“Preparing our students for a digital, global world does come at a cost,” Korpak said. “We are grateful for the community’s support of the November 2013 bond election. Bond proceeds have already been allocated to significantly enhance the overall technology infrastructure throughout the Forest Hills Public School district, thus preparing the district’s network to support eAchieve, and other key technology programs.”

According to Korpak under eAchieve, families do not have to rush out and purchase devices, and the district is looking at identifying possible options with a technology vendor which may offer families and students purchasing discounts.

“eAchieve is designed to enhance the educational experience by empowering students to create, communicate and collaborate to reach their individual potential,” Behm stated.



New Heating Systems Yield Huge Savings

Did you know that by installing a new boiler system at the following schools—Central Middle School, Central Woodlands 5/6, Northern Trails 5/6, and Thornapple Elementary—as part of the district's bond projects, we ultimately saved thousands of dollars in heating costs? In January and February alone, these new boiler systems cut the district's util-

ity costs by an average of 48 percent—saving the district \$29,800 in two months. This was even though February was a near-record coldest month, with average daily temperatures of 13 degrees Fahrenheit, and eight days below zero. Thank you community for your support of the 2013 bond election.

Spring Changes and Student Transitions

Spring brings about many changes—from warmer weather and longer days, to the site of new plant growth peeking through the snow-free ground. For our schools in Forest Hills, it is the time of year we call “Transitions.”

Kindergarten families will or already have attended a kindergarten kickoff event. Fourth-grade families will soon be attending open houses for their soon-to-be fifth-grader, if they will be going to a 5/6 building. Our sixth-grade families have already undertaken the task of selecting classes with their soon-to-be middle-schooler. Current eighth-graders discuss their high school schedule choices with their family. High school seniors are making final choices on their post-secondary adventures.

Transitions between grades, school buildings and high school graduation can be a stressful time in a student's life. In Forest Hills, we try to make these transitions as successful as possible for all students. There are many supportive mechanisms in place and activities we have to promote a positive transition. Some of these include:

- Kindergarten introduction programs;
- School tours;
- Open house events;
- Ambassador programs;
- Meet and greets;
- Pen pal letters;
- Peer-to-peer programs;
- Links program;
- End-of-the-year assemblies to learn from the principal and counselors about the next building;

- Articulation meetings between teachers, administrators, counselors and special education staff;
- Classroom guidance lessons at the beginning of the school year to introduce the counselors and share how they can be a support;
- Counselor visits from feeder schools;
- Scheduled help from counselors;
- And much more.

We know that transitions can cause stress. Many of our teens report feeling stressed. A survey by the American Psychological Association, found that nearly half of all teens said they were stressed by school pressures. Even young children experience stress. Family support is critical in helping the transition process be streamlined and as stress-free as possible.

Here are some ideas that may be helpful at home for your child:

- Encourage your child to talk about the upcoming transition.
 - What are things they are excited about?
 - What are some things they may be worried about?
- Emphasize the positives about the next school they will be attending.
- Help your child become familiar with their new school.
 - Tour the building during open summer hours if possible.

– Attend the parent/family nights held at the new school to help everyone become familiar with your child's new school.

- Listen to, and support, your child through this transition. Remind them that some stress is normal, and even healthy, in anticipation of changes. Often, just being a “listening ear” for your child as they go through these big transitions is the most valuable support you can give.
- For parents of middle-schoolers it is important to remember that this is a time when they want to develop autonomy and friends mean everything, but your presence is needed no matter how much they may push you away.
- By high school, your child is becoming largely independent, making many of their own decisions about how to spend their time. This is a time when they are exercising their increasing freedom, but still need your guidance and unconditional support.

Your child is part of a caring community of educators. If you see changes in behavior that persists, or stress is causing serious anxiety, or if a behavior causes significant problems at home or school, please know that your school counselor is available to offer suggestions and/or outside referrals, if needed. Transitions are a part of every family's life, and FHPS counselors are happy to assist your family through the transitions of the K-12 school years.
